We have used the quieter summer period to get the main hall and upstairs toilets redecorated. Roy Witham is making us additional noticeboards to allow Pre-School to display more of their artwork without risking damage to the walls.

The stage lighting is now working again – we discovered that we had lost nine light bulbs (costing £125 to replace) in what had presumably been a power surge at some point. The crucial pieces of equipment are fifteen feet up in the roof, making troubleshooting and replacement a real hassle –many thanks to Geoff Dalton and John Geddes for sorting this.

The lift continues to give us problems – we hope that we will be able to get the original manufacturers to come out and sort things properly. They have quoted £330 just to come and look at it, but we think this will be worth it to stop the string of breakdowns we have suffered recently.

The whole point of having a high-quality hall is to support a wide range of activities, so it is really good to see new user-groups develop. This autumn sees two Pilates classes each week (Phyllis Mason is the contact on 650738), and we have four performances lined up between now and Easter. 

People Power Voice Your concerns

Winster Parish Council

The Parish Council often takes up issues with the District and County Councils on behalf of residents and this is rightly one of its roles. However, there are occasions when letters, emails or phone calls from residents to the relevant authority help to focus the minds of the officers and gets results.

One instance recently was the weight restrictions on East Bank and West Bank - alternatives to a blanket 7.5 tonne limit are now being considered following letters from the Parish Council and several residents. Although we haven't won this yet, the voice of the village has been heard.

Of course, I wouldn't want to be seen to be actively encouraging mass letter writing, but you may be interested in the following, both of which are being dealt with (or not) by Dick Hardy at Derbyshire County Council, Matlock, DE4 3AG (dick.hardy@derbyshire.gov.uk):

Road surface on East Bank/The Flat - this is in a very poor state of repair. So far the Parish Council has managed to persuade to DCC to carry out some potholing work. However, more extensive repairs will not be carried out for up to a year. This road is used not only by the residents of the Flat, but also by others on foot. The surface is full of trip hazards and this will only get worse over the winter months. Are you one of these users?

Birchover Lane - this important link is also in a shocking state of repair. Despite communication with Dick Hardy over the last few years, and reassurances that the potholes will be filled and drainage improved, nothing much has happened. This is in desperate need of remedial work. Do you use this road, maybe when out walking or cycling? Is the mud and standing water a problem? Would you like to drive along it but don't feel your car can make it?

Beware the cost of short phone calls

If you still use BT for your phone calls, beware that you will pay a lot more for short phone calls from 1st October.

From then, BT will charge in “whole minutes” – so calling a mobile phone and cutting off after 5 seconds when it goes to an answering service will cost you a whole minute – plus an extra “connection fee”- that adds up to 16p during the working day, and 8p even at weekends. A local call lasting 61 seconds will cost you 2 minutes (+ connection charge) - 9p during office hours.

You don't have to use BT for your calls, and it can be a LOT cheaper if you don't – but it would take more space than I have here to explain how it works, and to suggest who else you should use. So, I've written a note about it – and you'll find this on the village website at www.winster.org/phones.htm

Events Diary

For anyone organising a public event, there is always a worry that you will find (when it is too late to change things) that there is a similar event being organised by someone else the following week. Or that there is a totally different event the night before yours, and that very few people will want to go to both. Some villages manage this by having a public "year planner" in their shop or Post Office, others use a diary book. We don't have either in Winster, but we do have something that is potentially more convenient still - the "Winster Diary" on the village website (www.winster.org).

The Winster Diary will show events as far into the future as anybody cares to list. For near-future events it clearly needs quite a lot of detail. But it can also show the merest outline of an event - something like "27 October 2007 - XYZ Club: Fundraising event in Burton Institute, more details later", which will make sure that nobody else will inadvertently organise anything that might clash or compete.

Getting your event into the diary is very simple - go to the bottom of the Diary page on the website, follow the link to the Event Form and fill in the details. I will paste your details into the diary (it's deliberately not automatic, to avoid anybody posting anything rude or silly) as soon as I can, and then everyone knows to work around your plans. If nobody in your group has Internet access, then drop me a written note (to The Old Farmhouse, East Bank).

Can I ask everyone who organises events to post details on the Diary as early as possible. It doesn't matter if you need to change or remove the details later; the important thing is to let others know what you are planning. For everyone, the Winster Diary is worth keeping an eye on - I do try to make sure that it lists everything that is going on in Winster (and sometimes in the surrounding area too).
