It wouldn't have done him any good!

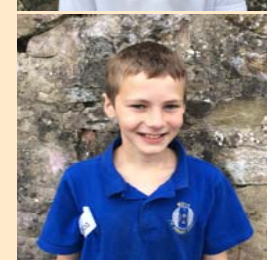
Eve got peckish and ate Eleanor's arm,

Tales of old Winster-with Eric Shimwell

This tale was told by Eric Shimwell, who lived for most of his 78 years in Winster. He is fondly remembered as a village character and his recollections were transcribed by one time village postmaster Paul Downing. His tales are reprinted here with Paul Downing's kind permission.

Life Centres Around the Pub

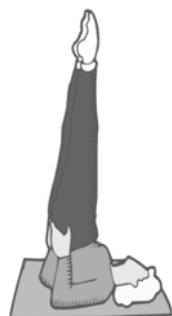
Something which comes out loud and clear in all of Eric's stories is how the pub was the centre of the life of the village. "In those days you had your characters that met every night," says Eric, "and you had a full evenings entertainment by just listening to the things that they'd done in the past". Eric remembers one story in particular about the night six Winster men walked over to Bonsall. It was common practice to walk to one of the nearer villages and pick up as much beer as they could carry and then stagger back home afterwards. Sometimes they lay out all night, says Eric, but on this occasion they were returning from Bonsall across the fields when a heavy fog came down.

There was a little chap in the lead when they came to one of the biggest fields in the district, called the "40 Acre". It wasn't a 40 acre field apparently, but everyone called it that, and in the middle of the field near the path there was an old mere hole which was used to water the cattle.

Well, the little chap in the front suddenly discovered that he was waist deep in water, but he didn't stop and instead called out to his mates, "Are y'all right?" "Aye. Coming," came the answering shout and it was not until they had all waded through the mere that they started to laugh - all the way to Winster.

Eric remembered that the beer was served from the cask into a gallon jug and then poured into pint, quart and gill containers brought by the customers.

Pub life was especially good at weekends, on pay night, when a group of regulars would have a tradition called "Sing, Say or Pay." Those participating would take turns to either sing a song, say a recitation or buy beer for all those taking part. A gallon of beer in those days would cost about 3/6d. Those who couldn't sing and who didn't want to pay might just recite, "The Black Sheep on the Mountain - Baaa," but for those who stood to sing it was usually possible to predict what they would sing, whether it be The Farmer's Boy or Burlington Bertie or some other hit of the day. In those days, everyone had a part to play in village life, and as Eric says, it was a "Wonderful, Wonderful time."

Winster Market House by H. C. Heathcote

Taken from the Journal of the Derbyshire Archaeological and Natural History Society 1906

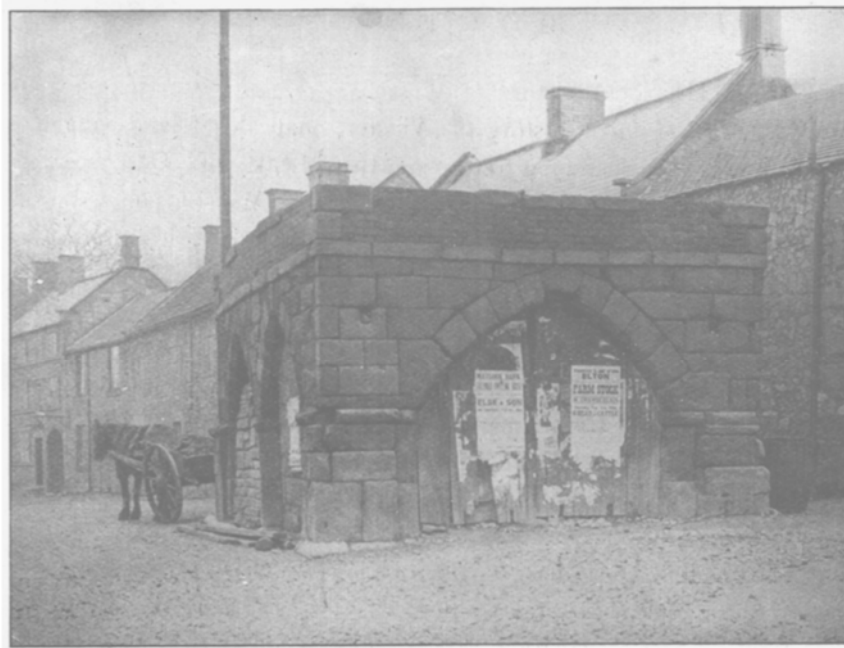
The local history of Winster, that old upland village - once a town - in the Peak of Derbyshire, seems to have been unwritten. Winster, named in the Domesday survey *Winsterne*, has had several speculative derivations of its name. The antiquity of the village is beyond doubt, as is manifested by the discoveries from time to time of stone implements and the numbers of ancient burial-places in the neighbourhood. The old lead mines show undoubted evidence of Roman occupation, but, "Hypotheses non fingo," Winster is one of the oldest market towns in Derbyshire. Tradition has it that a peck of potatoes, a peck of meal, and a pound of butter could be purchased for a shilling in, Winster market once upon a time.

The late Llewellynn Jewitt, that accomplished litterateur, lived at Winster many years, and spent much time and research in trying to find some early record of the old Market House, but without success. In *The Reliquary*, vol. xxi., P. 144, we find the following from his pen - "Dating back as it does from Saxon times, Winster is one of the oldest market towns, in the county of Derby. Its market once very flourishing, and even within the memory of the oldest inhabitants, 'Wi long rows o'stalls, and the people so thick and throng together you could a walk'd a top o' their heads' is now, however, a thing of the past having for many years fallen into desuetude. The old venerable Market House, one of the few examples, spared to us, still happily remains, and although but rarely opened except at the time of the annual wakes, gives an air of importance and antiquity to the place. The building stands nearly in the middle of the main street of the village the principal thoroughfare being on one side and a footpath on the other. It is two stories in height, the lower one of massive stone and the upper of very ancient brickwork with stone facings. Of the Market House nothing is known, nor is it necessary to conjecture. That it has stood some centuries there is no doubt."

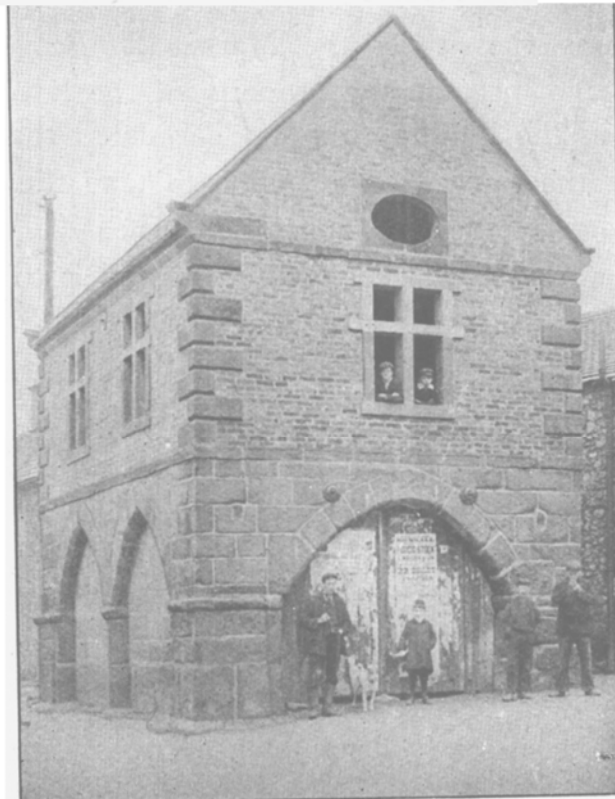
After various vicissitudes the Market House, a little over twenty years ago, became the property of the late Mr. Joseph Greator, but the building got so dilapidated that it became necessary for the safety of the public to take the upper story down, as shown in the first illustration (1904). For a nominal sum Mr Greator most generously conveyed it to the present owners, who, in response to a general desire evinced by the lovers of the ancient buildings of Derbyshire, have secured the restoration of this ancient relic of old time.

The National Trust for Places of Historical Interest kindly gave the services of its architect, Mr. Weir, who has been twice down from London to plan the restoration, which has been carried out under the superintendence of Mr. Henry Rye, of Bakewell, architect for the Duke of Rutland, the work being done by local labour. The old material has been used except in places where it was absolutely necessary to put new. Mr. Rye reports:-"I have visited the above building several times at the request of the National Trust Society, and also the Society for the Preservation of Ancient Buildings, and have been able to report in all cases that the work of rebuilding the Old Market House has been and is being carried out in a sound and most conservative manner, no pains being spared to keep it to the old lines of this very interesting building. It has been a great pleasure to me to see work being so preserved."

The work of restoration is now practically completed, as shown in illustration No. 2 (1905), leaded lights to the windows having been added since the photograph was taken.



The maintenance and repair of the roadway in the main street was attached to the market, extending from the front of the building about seventy yards in a westerly direction. By agreement this has been transferred to the Bakewell Rural District Council, £20 having been paid to that body as consideration money. The market rights and the tolls accruing therefrom have been vested with the Winster Parish Council. About £120 has been expended in the work of rebuilding. The credit of the whole undertaking may be justly given to Mrs. Childers Thompson, who has acted as hon. treasurer, and to whom is due the first inception of the restoration. The building is about to be conveyed to The National Trust, and its future preservation will be thereby secured.



Winster School and Monyash School Federation Proposal Outcome

On the 19th July, following the end of the Federation consultation period, the Governing Bodies of Winster and Monyash schools held a joint meeting to review the consultation feedback and decide whether or not to continue with the Federation as proposed. The Governing Bodies unanimously decided to proceed as proposed, with the date for The White Peak Federation to come into being set as 1st January 2018. We are all looking forward to this new stage in the life of Winster school, and thank all those who have offered their support.

Winster Village Shop – Loan Note Update (August 2017)

The original objectives set by the Board from the recent loan note programme were to generate sufficient funding to pay off the loan to SIB Venture Capital and also to raise sufficient monies for repairs and improvements to the infrastructure in the shop

We have received 30 new loans from villagers and home owners and issued loan notes to all those concerned. On behalf of the Board, we would like to thank everyone for their support and generosity.

As a consequence, we have been able to pay off the outstanding SIB loan (£8500) and thereby achieve the first of our objectives. The second objective was to raise an additional £10k to enable repairs and refurbishment to the shop to take place, and I am pleased to report that just over 50% of the target has been achieved.

The list of work that we have identified includes the following:

- Additional funds to enable the replacement front door to be completed
- Replacement of air conditioning unit
- IT equipment and support to ensure secure and continuous operation
- Internal painting of walls and ceiling
- External painting of front of shop
- Replacement of freezers and chillers
- New shelving

The Board will set out the priorities of the work and get estimates and quotes for the work. We do not believe we have sufficient funds at this juncture to complete all the work.

The loan note programme remains open to anyone else who would like to show their support for the shop in this way.

The Board will update the progress of the work at the Annual General Meeting to be held later this year.

Winsters Garden and Countryside Group

enjoyed a grand day out on July 20th. Members and non-members alike boarded the coach in Main Street at 9.30 a.m. to travel to two gardens in Shropshire. Our first stop was the Dorothy Clive Garden near

Market Drayton, arriving just as the clouds lifted and the rain ceased to fall. The garden was created in a disused quarry and is a wooded hillside site, with occasional revealed views over open countryside. Other delights included a stag sculpture by the waterfalls, and on the lower slopes, herbaceous borders, a large natural pond and new a glasshouse displaying imaginative and colourful planting schemes. The cafe provided a tasty lunch taken on the sunny, tropically planted terrace. Although interesting and enjoyable, the general view was that this garden would perhaps be better visited in the spring when the rhododendrons and azaleas would be at their best, thereby enhancing a visit to this predominantly woodland garden.

Our second port of call was Wollerton Old Hall Garden, where an altogether different prospect greeted us. A formal garden with terraces and enclosed avenues opening up into densely planted and colourful 'rooms'. Whilst simply wandering or sitting, the eye was continually led in various directions along the avenues, to focal points within the garden such as sculptures and statuary, water features, summer-houses and terraces, or back to the wonderful old house itself. A particular feature of the garden and grounds were the huge terracotta planters, displaying showy cream hydrangeas with contrasting underplanting. After tea and cakes in the smart Tea Room, we headed for the Sales area where many of us were tempted to purchase a plant or two for our own humble plots at home. A happy band of Winstonians returned to the village by 6.00 p.m., inspired and raring to go!

If you are interested to hear more on gardening matters, then please come along to our September meeting on Thursday 28th September in the Burton Institute, to hear Stuart Dixon BA(hons) CPSE. MI HORT present a talk about English Roses. Roses are one of our oldest and most loved garden plants and at 'Gardeners World Live' in June 2017 they were voted as the plant that has made the most impact in our gardens in the last 50 years.

Stuart Dixon has a love of traditional English gardens and is a speaker for the RHS, Hardy Plant Society, Cottage Garden Society, Plant Heritage and the National Trust. He has restored his own 18th century garden in Nottinghamshire from where he has gained much of his knowledge and expertise. Stuart will be talking to us about the Roses of David Austin. (see page 7)
